- 5. Gary also suggested getting together with one of the local Garden Clubs; the Horticultural Society or the Broadmoor Garden Club, and see about participating in their plant sale. That would be bonsais for us. We could purchase wholesale tress, pot them up and sell them for a profit at their annual plant sale.
- 6. A couple of different ways to make our monthly raffle a little more interesting. One is to raffle off a "Lotto Tree". That is a bonsai tree covered with lottery tickets. And the other way is to purchase wholesale pre-bonsai trees, put them in a very simple pot

and raffle or auction it off at our monthly meeting.

In this case they would be bonsai masters (or the closest thing we can find!!) and have a one or two day workshop that each member would pay a fee to attend. Cheaper for both of us.

HIGHLIGHTS OF DECEMBER 12TH MEETING

hough the weather was not cooperating, we still ended up with twelve people at our December meeting.

Before heading out for our Christmas Luncheon we had a meeting to cover some important issues.

Dave informed us that the board had their first OBM (outside board meeting) and several things were discussed including the revision of the club bylaws. These are, at the present time, being reviewed by the board and in the next several weeks they will be made available for the members to review and then we will vote on any changes that are made.

The treasurer's report, as of 11/30/09, is \$1,216.67 and savings is \$35.45. I was able to add \$60 to this total from ads that will be appearing in our 2010 Yearbook.

There will be a Show Committee meeting on the 6th of February. This committee consists of the same people that were on the committee last year.

An audit committee was formed. This con-

sists of Ross Huddleson and Dave Conlin. They will be working on a time to meet and go over the club financial records. This will be done on a yearly basis.

In February we will be making our own pots out of clay. We did this for the first time last year and it was a lot of fun. They will be fired in March and we will be able to pick them up in April.

In March we will be doing Spencer's Garden Show again this year.

In April we will be doing a workshop on repotting trees. We will discuss soil and you will be able to bring one of your trees and learn how to repot it. Steve will bring a few five gallon pails with bonsai soil mix in it for everyone's use.

Also in April we will be putting together a group collecting trip in the mountains for those who want to do a little Yamadori.

May 22-23 we will be having a demonstration at Bill Fox's home on pruning and styling. On Sunday there will be a workshop for you to work on a tree that you will get for a small fee (fee will be determined later, depending on cost of tree).

Denver will once again be having their show on Father's Day weekend in June. We would like to be able to put some of our trees in their show so if you have a tree you feel like showing off now is the time to do it.

We also discussed the idea of having our annual bonsai show in the month of July instead of September. Right now it is scheduled for September, but if things work out and we can find another location, we will be rescheduling. Some of the options for a different location are: the Citadel Mall, Beamis Art School, Colorado College Cornerstone building or BAC Business of Arts Center in Manitou.

Dave would like to nominate two people to be Members at Large since this is something that is required by our bylaws. We nominated Cliff Broyles and Bill Fox.

FROM THE CLUB ARCHIEVES

Natural Spider Miticide

By Carl L. Rosner

Ingredients:

- Water 1.
- 2. Oil
- Rubbing alcohol 3.
- 4. Dish detergent



Directions:

Fill a gallon jug with water and add one (1) or two (2) tablespoons of dishwashing detergent and one (1) tablespoon of vegetable oil (or Neem oil). Shake up the jug to mix the ingredients.

Fill a small spray bottle with this mixture from the gallon jug. Just before using, add

one (1) or two (2) caps full of rubbing alcohol and spray immediately. If you do not use the entire contents of the spray bottle, the next time you use it, make sure you put another capful or two of alcohol in the mix, as the alcohol will evaporate.

This mixture can be stored for months on end, as it does not seem to go bad.

> Spray on plants covering all leaf and stem surfaces. You may have to spray from three to four times with intervals of three days. I have eliminated almost any kind of pest that has attacked my trees, including scale.

I do not wash off the spray and have seen no adverse reaction to the trees from this mixture.



THINGS TO DO IN JANUARY

uring the bleak winter months, the extreme cold temperatures can take its toll on all of your trees. The main task is to protect them from the very cold weather. These tips are given assuming that you followed the past procedures on making sure your trees were placed somewhere that they will be protected. Whether that is in a outside window sill, buried in their pots or you built a poly house.

Check the soil in the pots to make sure it has not dried out. If so, water the soil in the morning so it is just damp.

Don't wait until spring to do all of your maintenance! Winter is an excellent time

need. Finally, watch out for mice making homes in your trees. Use mothballs or a hungry cat to prevent problems!

This is the heart of winter, and while your trees are deep in dormancy, there is still work to be done. Continue your winter care by keeping your trees mulched and protected from freezing





for heavy pruning, new design and carving, needle plucking on pines (2-3 yr old needles). Don't forget to take off old wire and add new wire.

This is a good time to plan your repotting schedule for spring. Draw up a list of trees that need repotting and order your soil requirements and any pots you may weather. Don't forget to check them as they do need watered from time to time, although their water needs will be minimal.

Wash all con-

tainers that were used in training and growing bonsai. Use a mild laundry detergent, rinse thoroughly with clean water and then soak for 10 minutes in a household bleach (not scented) solution of 1 part bleach to 9 parts of water. This is a strong solution so do use plastic gloves or a pair of tongs when placing containers into the bleach solution and removing them from the solution. This soaking sanitizes the container and will kill any fungi which may have contaminated the container.

Prepare soil mixes for your potting and repotting in the next few months. On nice warm days you can re-shape your deciduous trees with light pruning.

If you have wired any bonsai in the late fall you should check to make certain the wires are not too tight. Even though trees are dormant there is a certain amount of growth that takes place. Remove the wires if you see signs of wire damage to the bark.

At this time it would be a good idea to clean and sharpen all your tools. Then wipe them down real good with a light oil to help preserve them.

"Each model is unique, and individually disassembled, cut, melted, filed, smashed, then reassembled to replicate a real fender bender. Some models might work perfectly with a bonsai you already have, but generally you should expect to create a new bonsai around the vehicles, often placing the tree more to the side of a pot to make room for the vehicle. No passengers have been injured in Crash Bonsai accidents, although some drivers have reported a brief, even euphoric loss of consciousness."
