

Who was the actual source of inspiration for Zeami's Hachi-No-Ki character, Tsuneyo Genzayemon?

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The character **Tsuneyo Genzayemon (Sano Genzaemon Tsuneyo)** in Zeami's Noh play *Hachi-no-Ki* ("The Potted Trees") appears to have been based on a figure from medieval Japanese legend rather than on a firmly documented historical individual.^{japanesewiki+1}

- One scholarly summary notes that while Tokiyori was certainly a historical person, "**if Tsuneyo was also a real person, his life's story has been lost to history.**"^{magiminiland}

So the best answer is:

The inspiration for Zeami's Tsuneyo Genzayemon was the legendary Sano Genzaemon Tsuneyo of the Tokiyori pilgrimage tales, not a clearly identifiable historical individual. The character derives from medieval folklore surrounding Hōjō Tokiyori's disguised travels and was probably shaped from a local Sano clan tradition that later became incorporated into Noh drama.^{japanesewiki+2}

Interestingly, the story became so influential that many later generations treated Sano Tsuneyo as a historical model of **samurai loyalty and hospitality**, even though his actual historical existence remains uncertain.^{japanesewiki+1}
